



3rd Alton Kestrel Beaver Colony Annual Report 2024-2025

What an incredible year we've had in Kestrel Colony! Our 22 strong colony, split as always across our four lodges – Bumblebees, Beetles, Ladybirds, and Grasshoppers – has once again shown fantastic enthusiasm, teamwork and creativity. Our lodge leaders and buddies have done a wonderful job of helping new Beavers settle in and across the year we've awarded around 300 badges – including an impressive collection of Challenge Awards.

Autumn Adventures

We kicked off the Autumn 2024 term with team challenges and a warm welcome for new members.





We then learnt how to pitch tents and explored fire safety with a proper campfire, s'mores and songs! The Beavers loved the chance to practice knots and even got stuck into cooking over flames.





September also saw the start of the Communicator Badge. Beavers learnt how to make phone calls, practiced remembering important contact details and tackled some fun decoding and coding challenges. Families even played their part by receiving surprise calls!

October was packed with variety – from celebrating apples on Apple Day to a lively evening learning Morris Dancing with a local group. New Beavers were invested in front of their proud families during the same session.









We launched our "Behind the Scenes in Healthcare" badge series with guest speakers helping Beavers understand different healthcare roles. A real highlight in November was our Remembrance-themed Sleepover where Beavers enjoyed activities based on The Blitz and slept in pop-up tents in The Den.





The Beavers proudly took part in the town's Remembrance Parade the following day, showing great respect and maturity. Arthur led the way as flag bearer during the procession to the service, with Freddie taking over flag duties for the return. It was especially heartwarming to see Freddie's younger brother, Alexander – representing Squirrels – also carrying the flag, making it a true family affair of honour and pride.
